## Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

"Peter said to him in reply, 'Though all may have their faith in you shaken, mine will never be.'" Peter thought pretty highly of his faith. On the eve of Christ's death he professed, in essence, that he was more committed to Jesus than anyone else. And yet, we know how the story turns out: when put to the test in the moment that mattered, Peter "began to curse and to swear, 'I do not know the man.'"

On this Palm Sunday, we hear many stories of betrayal. The crowds, who once hailed Jesus with "hosannas," will soon be chanting, "Let him be crucified!" Judas, who was counted among the closest companions of the Lord, turns him over to the chief priests for thirty pieces of silver. And Peter falls short in the moment of truth, and then "went out and began to weep bitterly."

Here in the hours before Christ faces crucifixion, He is surrounded by false friends. Just when He most needs the support, He is abandoned. No wonder He feels the suffering even of being forgotten by His Father while He hangs on the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" What trials Jesus endured, not only physically but emotionally as well.

It's easy to glaze over this as a story from the past that does not involve us. But in truth, Jesus suffered all of this for each one of us. He would have preferred things to go otherwise, but submitted to His Father's will because He knew "it must come to pass in this way." Jesus' passion and death took place in order to bring us salvation. So today, may we not be counted among His many betrayers, but may we be truly grateful for the gift of the cross and show it through a life of sincere faith.

## Triduum Preparation

**Holy Thursday,** April 13th is the beginning of the Easter Triduum. (Triduum means three days.) The three days between Holy Thursday evening and Easter Sunday evening are the high point of the church year. During these three days we gather for prayer several times as a community. Over and over again the church reminds us that our keeping of these days is a single celebration of the Lord's passion, death, and resurrection. We are not preparing for Easter, these days are Easter.

The season of Lent ends quietly at sundown on Holy Thursday. Unique to that evening's prayer is the presentation of oils blessed by Archbishop ListECKI two days earlier at the Chrism Mass. The washing of feet is a sign of service that both reflects and judges our lives. That service is made more real with our donations from our Lenten rice bowls and other Lenten alms.

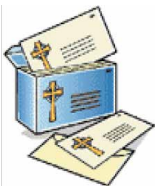
**Good Friday:** Our celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday begins in silence, without any greeting or song, again emphasizing the unity of our three day festival. Good Friday is a day of fast and abstinence. This is not a Lenten fast, however; Lent is over. It is an Easter fast, one of anticipation and joy.

It would be easy to see these three days as historical re-enactments of the last hours of Jesus' life. But we do not need to make believe that we don't know about Jesus' resurrection. "To stress the history is to miss the mystery." In our proclamation of Jesus' Passion and our communal veneration of His cross, we slowly begin to see how our own suffering and death are not eliminated but transformed. That is the mystery!

Good Friday is the only day in the entire year that the Eucharist is not celebrated. The liturgy ends with a simple communion service and we depart in silence to await with prayer and fasting the great Vigil on Saturday evening.

**The Easter Vigil:** On this night, after 40 days of prayer, fasting and almsgiving, and after our feet have been washed and the cross has been venerated, the Church calls us to keep watch, to keep vigil into the night. (In fact, in order to set this Vigil apart, liturgical guidelines require that it cannot begin at the same time as an anticipated Mass is normally celebrated, nor can it begin before dark.)

On this night we gather in total darkness, see the flame of the Easter candle pierce that darkness and spread its light through the church. On this night we give ourselves over to the reading of Scripture and the singing of psalms in order to make some sense of all that has happened and is soon to happen. In some years that means we welcome the newest disciples of Christ into the household of the Church. It always means that we gather around the waters of the baptismal font and renew our own baptismal commitment to follow in the footsteps of Christ. Finally, we gather at the Lord's table to be fed with the Body and Blood of our Lord to strengthen us for our mission. The community needs to celebrate the Vigil whether or not any new members are present. Your presence is needed to make our prayer as strong as it can possibly be!

Passion and palms are not enemies; they make a single mystery. ~ Palm Sunday suggests what Good Friday will trumpet to the far ends of the earth: Our King triumphs not simply on Easter, He triumphs on Calvary. The tragedy is triumph; the sadness is gladness (Walter Burghardt.)

## Holy Thursday ~ April 13th

Rice bowls /other Lenten alms will be collected as part of our liturgy this evening. There will be Adoration following the Holy Thursday service in the chapel until midnight.

For Christians, every year has its origins and climax at a time determined by the earth and the sun and the moon and the human-made cycle of a seven-day week. The marvelous plan of earth's placement and the sun's placement, of axis and of orbit make a cycle within human cycles so that days can be named and remembered and rhythms established. First, we wait for the angle of the earth's axis to make day and night equal (spring equinox). Then we wait for the moon to be full.

When these cosmic movements occur, then the Church gathers for the Passover of the Lord. Only then do we dare to wash one another's feet and reverence the tree of life. We immerse ourselves in the darkness, in the stories, and in the death-defying waters of baptism. In the midst of our busy lives, we are reminded of our origins and our destiny. Such confrontations can be most inconvenient – but birth and death are rarely convenient. Keenly aware of our dependence upon God, we humbly surrender to the mystery.

# HOLY WEEK 2017

## Good Friday - April 14th

Behold, the wood of the cross on which is hung our salvation. O come, let us adore. We gather quietly on Friday and listen to scripture, including the passion from the gospel of John. We pray at length for all the world's needs. Then the holy cross is held up in our midst, and we come forward one by one to do reverence with a kiss or a bow or a genuflection. All the while we sing, not only of sorrow, but of the glory of the cross. We continue in fasting and prayer and vigil, in rest and quiet through Saturday (Liturgy Training Publications). ~ Friday is a day of fasting for those between the ages of 18 and 59 and abstinence from meat for ages of 14 through 59. ~ The annual collection for the shrines and the people of the Holy Land is taken up at the afternoon service.




